Hula, More than Just a Dance

Aloha! Welcome to Hawaii! Aloha means "hello" or "goodbye" in the Hawaiian language. I'm Malia, and I'm your hula teacher for today. Have you heard of hula before? How much do you know about hula? Before we start our lesson, I want to tell you about it.

Hula is a traditional dance from Hawaii, and it has been a part of Hawaiian life for a long time. The early Hawaiians didn't have a writing system, so they used hula to tell stories. Hula is a language through body movements, and it has passed down stories from one generation to the next.

Now it's time to dance! Remember that you become a storyteller when you dance hula. You tell a story with your hands, feet, and hips. Oh, you need to take off your shoes and socks! Hula is always done barefoot.

Let's start with the hand gestures. Every gesture in hula has a meaning. Wave your fingers while you move your arms up and down. This gesture is called ua in the Hawaiian language, and it means "rain." What about the sun? Hawaiians make a circle with their arms above their heads. That's ka la, the "sun." These gestures are so simple that you can easily remember them.

Next, bend your knees a little and step from side to side. While you step to the side, move your hips naturally. Now move your hands with your hips and feet!

Well, time's up! That's all for today. Remember that hula is not just a dance. Hula is a language and a way of storytelling, so it is important to Hawaiians.
